I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection! Philippians 3:10

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As we enter into these final days of Lent, we look forward to the most Holy of Weeks. We watch and pray our way through the final hours of Jesus' life, all the while longing to share in his glorious resurrection. It's tempting to jump to Easter, that day when death is vanquished and the power of evil is destroyed. But the Church compels us to journey through these final days, soaking in the stories that lead to Easter's triumph.

Paul, writing to the early communities of faith, expressed the longing of his heart to experience Easter when he said, "I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection." Paul had discovered that the Easter event was not an end to human suffering or evil in the world. Rather Easter was God's exclamation point that the heart that leans in toward God can be healed. Earlier stories of Paul (known then as Saul) tell us that he sought to destroy the Jesus movement and carried papers that would have led to

the arrest and likely death of the apostles. While on the way to secure their arrest, he encountered the risen Christ near Damascus (Acts 9). It was an event that changed his life from the inside out. His life was never the same and he soon became the most profound advocate for the very movement he was trying to destroy. Changed hearts become the most powerful witness to the good news of Easter.

Easter tells us that God is more powerful than anything that would seek to destroy our life or rob us of joy. The spiritual journey of Lent invites us to name those things and place them in the palm of God's hand that the Holy Spirit might begin a process of re-creation within us. Lent is a time to practice putting a new vision of our lives into practice – one day at a time. If you struggle to be generous, practice one act of mercy each day. If you find it difficult to forgive, ask

God to bless someone in the news whom the world thinks beyond redemption. If you catch yourself being wasteful, take some time to tend to God's creation.


We are grateful to local clergy for their generous Bible Challenge offerings:

Where is God? Have you ever pondered that question? How can we have a closer relationship with God in the here and now?



As we start the Easter season for 2016, I sincerely hope that your Lenten journey this year has been a period of repentance and renewal. I have found in my own life that Lent is not necessarily a time of only negatives; on the contrary, it can also call for something positive and lasting in our lives. For example, the Lenten season can cultivate a deeper faith in God, turn a hardened heart to acts of charity, and encourage a deeper, loving relationship with the Lord. It can also point us toward joining in more activities of Parish life. For my own journey I made a list of things I would like to change. On my change list I wrote: living without fear and focusing on the Love of God instead. Another one was overcoming self-criticism and believing in a God who loves me and accepts me as I am. In fact, in Stephen Ministry training this week, we were reminded that the first disciples of Christ were simply told "follow me" and Jesus wasn't asking for anything else. He wasn't demanding us to change first, (like being better, smarter, and holier, etc.). We only need to be ourselves right now, right this minute. We don't have to pre-qualify ourselves or meet any expectations. In John 12:26, Jesus tells us: "Whoever serves me must follow me; and where I am, my servant also will be." The wonderful thing is—there is always time to do this—to make those positive changes in our lives to follow Him and also bring our time, talent, and commitment to the Lord, whatever season we are currently in.

My own journey of instruction with Stephen Ministry is also quickly coming to a close, which started last September 2015 and will consummate in May 2016, when I am commissioned as a Stephen Minister, along with my assigned group of associates who have also shared in this wonderful journey with me. It is a daunting task, studying such subjects as grief, depression, suicide, aging and death and dying. In addition, topics we will study in April include hospitalization, long-term care and divorce. These are all scary subjects and as a Stephen Minister, I will be caring for people in crisis situations—that include these subjects and many others. I have heard the phrase that "Aging is not for the faint hearted." I would also like to add: No matter how messy life can get, God never stops loving us. Simply put: God IS Love. If I have learned anything in life so far, it is this: We are not alone. No matter where we are in life, in every circumstance, God is present: he never leaves us.

In closing, I want to share a reading (and a wonderful reflection) from my Stephen Ministry Training Manual. In Volume 2, Page 470 it reads: "As you regularly read the Gospels and other parts of the Old and New Testaments, ask yourself the questions that follow: What is God: giving you? Requiring of you? Asking of you? Promising you? Empowering you to do? This instruction also consists of locating personal and meaningful scripture passages and meditating on them. The third thing on my change list? It was to "never stop being your own beautiful self." Please put this on your list too. This is what God wants us to do.

DIOCESE OF NORTHERN CALIFORNIA INITIATES 2016 TRAINING

Our diocese offers a steady stream of informative workshops and conferences for clergy and laity. In early February two sessions were held at St. John's Episcopal Church Roseville and St. Paul's had representatives in attendance.

Friday, February 5th a congregational leadership workshop focused on "Sources of Transformation in Community." About twenty from Episcopal churches near Roseville attended including three St. Paul's members: Rev. Anne Slakey, Loreen Kleinschmidt, and Phelps Hobart. Discussion centered around a white board diagram containing four interconnected circles – in the center circle was prayer and worship, the outlining circles were labeled:

- Study and learning
- ♦ Action work and service
- ♦ Life in Community

Attendees broke into small groups at the room's tables to discuss each element then reconvene to present insights as a whole. Intended to reflect and strategize together about faith formation in our congregations, all came away with a shared experience. The possibility exists that a spark ignited that will enhance some parishes' life.

Saturday, February 6th The training, a 2016 Congregational Leadership Conference, had an antiracism theme "More than Just Color." Bishop Barry Beisner spent the day with the one hundred plus parish delegates and diocesan staff members attending. This training is under the auspice of the diocesan Commission for Intercultural Ministry. The conference goal was to help Episcopal worship communities appreciate and welcome the diversity of people among us and around us. Here is text from the conference announcement...

"Diversity goes beyond ethnicity and race, as we come to church from different religious backgrounds, family systems, ages and sexual orientations. This specific anti-racism training is required for many positions of leadership within our congregations and in our diocese. This specific training is also an opportunity for all of us to grow to more faithfully resemble the Church we are called to be, and will help us to live the promises of our Baptismal Covenant. Together, this diocese will learn, understand and be trained to step into a more responsive and welcoming future. Anti-racism training will be available on an ongoing basis throughout the year in our diocese."

Everyone had nametags and received a locally prepared handout approaching seventy pages. As the day progressed each of the pages was shown on the church sanctuary's two audio-visual screens. Like Friday we went back and forth between the large aroup and the tables to listen to and discuss the day's various subjects. With racism as a topic and a church setting, it is hard to avoid frequently overworked clichés challenge, commitment, discovery, encourage, openness, reconciliation, willingness, etc. The subjects presented were diverse; for example woven into the discussion were the Martyrs of Japan - Christians in Japan persecuted for their faith during the 17th century. A primary topic was structural and institutional racism in society. Avoided was racism within the Episcopal Church - maybe another time.

St. John's Roseville was a great host. The facility and training tools were superb. Food and beverages were ideal. The members of the Diocesan Commission for Intercultural Ministries had obviously spent a great deal of time and effort. Phelps Hobart was the sole parish representative to the February 6th training. This subject will be covered again in different formats in different locations. Our vestry is using a training program from Trinity Institute.

In a December 2015 letter to the diocesan clergy, Bishop Beisner stated: "Beginning Eastertide 2016, anti-racism training will now be required for all licensed ministries. This means that any request for new licenses or for renewal of existina licenses must include assurance of completion of anti-racism training, in addition to all other current requirements. I hope that you will help all concerned to see this as an opportunity for us to grow to more faithfully resemble the Church we are called to be, and be something to help us live the promises of our Baptismal Covenant. Certainly the times call for it."
