SPRUCING UP AT ST. PAUL'S



A big Thank You to all who gave time and effort to our April 2 and June 11 clean up days at St. Paul's. Much was accomplished with the help of Sharon and Richard Kennedy, Father Eric, Rev. Anne Slakey, William Jaeger and Joann Askew (apologies to anyone I have left out). We polished brass, cleaned floors of candle wax and dirt in the church and parish hall, vacuumed chairs, polished church columns and floors, washed 15th Street steps, gardened, cleaned the parking lot of leaves and debris.

The realities of life are daunting. I had a procedure at UC Davis recently, and because hospital staff had to do an IV on my left hand, I now have a visible bruise that reminds me everyday of my own morality. Thankfully, the bruise will eventually fade, but the timing of this experience it leads me perfectly into my next article for Stephen Ministry: Hospitalization and dealing with circumstances beyond one's control. Some health experiences can be chronic and may lead to longer stays and unanticipated physical problems. I'll repeat the first sentence here: the realities of life are daunting—and I will add "especially for those in long-term care". Being in a hospital or moving into a nursing home for any amount of time signifies a loss of autonomy and can involve handing the responsibility of one's life to another. You find you need assistance for some of the simplest tasks in life, like bathing, brushing your teeth, or dressing for bed. Stephen Ministry brings the presence of Christ into places of discord; in settings of hospitals and care homes. We talk to people who have been diagnosed with leukemia; We sit next to the beds of people with Lou Geh-

rig's disease; we hold the hands of those going chemotherapy treatment. In every circumstance we are called to witness, we follow Christ and it is both a challenging and rewarding ministry—the courage to bring love and hope in the context of sheer isolation, loneliness and desperation. Stephen Ministry brings Christ into places where grief and sorrow have a voice, and we listen with compassion, showing God's love wherever we go.

Sometimes it's hard to visit friends and family in "rest homes" or these types of facilities and we may feel powerless to do anything for our friends and loved ones—so what can anyone do? We can focus on the positive; we focus on what people can actually do while staying in a long-term facility. Some of the suggestions in my Stephen Ministry training are very simple, yet very profound, and can lead to a person feeling useful and also feeling better about the circumstances they are presently in. For example, patients can initiate a prayer list—(praying for others is a huge benefit)! They can call and check on members of the congregation. If they have a gift of crocheting, they can

make blankets, prayer shawls, or warm caps for those receiving chemotherapy. It is like a pebble thrown in a lake: the residual circle embraces every wave around it. We make waves when we care for others in anyway we can. Sometimes prayer is our only option and best defense against the weariness of the world. Look at page 857 of our Common Book of Prayer. It states: "What are intercession and petition? Intercession brings before God the needs of others; in petition, we present our own needs, that God's will may be done."

Reading all of this, I am sure you are still curious to what kind of "procedure" I had and its outcome. First thing to know: they were looking for a persistent cough I have and the procedure is called a bronchoscopy. It is a way for a specialist to look at an individual's air passages. I talked to the doctors throughout the procedure and they found what is referred to as a "web" that interferes with my breathing capacity. Keep in mind that everyone has some type of procedure done everyday. The blessing is that all of our personal experiences can become opportunities to pray for

others who are going through similar circumstances and we can pray for all the medical staff involved, as well.

I will admit, too, that sometimes it feels that God is gone when we are in the midst of having medical procedures done. In our anxiety, we cannot perceive that he is right beside us, holding our hand. During my test He was there—I heard Him in the voice of the tentative nurse that told me "I was doing fine and to keep breathing."

Taking a walk after I got home later, I perceived the sun, as its bright rays disappeared behind thick tree branches—but it still shone out. The light was still there, even when obstructed—His presence was still giving the light of life, still giving hope to the world. May the great healer show His presence in your life this very day. And please consider joining the family of Stephen Ministry. Training will start again in the Fall of 2016.

BEQUESTS

St Paul's has recently been the recipient of two generous donations from the estates of members of the community.

The vestry has considered ways to responsibly support the current needs of our community and promote a secure future for St. Paul's parish. We have kept in mind that these gifts cannot replace the continued support of our church family but can, if managed well, supplement the vision and ministry of the church.

We received the first of these gifts totaling approximately \$170,000 in late June. The benefactor had expressed the wish that the money be used for maintaining and preserving our historic church building. The vestry has willingly agreed to this designation.

Based on our current needs, the vestry has placed \$40,000 as seed money for the purpose of replacing our aging Heating/Air Conditioning system. The current system, as you probably have experienced, has required frequent repairs and is nearing the end of its useful life. This money will provide a beginning from which to raise funds for the entire project.

The vestry also recognized the need to stabilize and maintain the beautiful stained glass windows which are an integral part of our building and heritage. The amount of \$20,000 has been designated for this purpose. The remainder of this generous gift has been placed in our Building Fund for other needs related to the Church Building and Parish Hall.

The second gift is expected in the near future and I will report to you as it is received.
